Transportation, Distribution & Logistics

The **Transportation, Distribution & Logistics Educator Field Study** was held on February 24, 2010, and began at **Midlands Technical College Airport Campus** with a presentation by **Tamie Head**, Human Resource Representative for the **Columbia Metropolitan Airport**, who spoke about career opportunities with the airport.

The group then boarded a bus for **Flextronics International** in West Columbia. Headquartered in Singapore, Flextronics is a leading Electronics Manufacturing Services (EMS) provider focused on

The **Information Technology Educator Field Study** was held on March 2, 2010, at **South Carolina Educational Television's (SCETV) Telecommunications Center**. The day began with a welcome from **Samantha Turner**, MEBA's Workforce Development Coordinator, and opening remarks by **Bobbie Kennedy** of SCETV. **Lonnie Emard**, Executive Director of the **Consortium for Enterprise Systems Management**, spoke with the group about the workforce needs in the information technology field as well as skill and training requirements. **Brack Clemons**, a technology educator with SCETV, also spoke with the group and **Ann Brown**, Chief Operating Officer of **Microburst Learning**, provided concluding remarks.

Architecture & Construction

The **Architecture & Construction Educator Field Study** was held on March 12, 2010, and began with a presentation and tour of **Mashburn Construction**, led by **Gene Haskins**, Senior Project Manager. The group then boarded a bus and traveled to the **Home Builders Association's (HBSA) Home and Garden Show** where they toured the show and heard from several industry professionals on various topics. **Jackie Adams** with **Paul D. The group then learned about green careers in construction from **Joseph Gilmore** of **Gilmore Consulting**. **Patsy Sharpe**, Executive Director of **Palmetto Utility Protection Services** also addressed the group. Participants then enjoyed lunch and additional time at the HBA Home & Garden Show.

Midlands Students Build Laptops at Create IT Computer Camp

Twenty Midlands high school students recently build their own garnet-and-black laptop computers during **Create IT Computer Camp**, held February 27 through March 6, 2010, at the Carolina Coliseum. **The Consortium for Enterprise Systems Management** with its partner, the **University of South Carolina**, sponsored the camp.

Students were selected from 128 applicants based on their grade-point average, a letter of recommendation and an essay. They learned about computer applications, computer development, software development and the wide-range of exciting career opportunities in information technology. Students also toured USC's campus and **BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina's** data center.

The goal was to motivate high-achieving high school students to pursue an interest in technology and ultimately a career in information technology. The camp was taught by USC professors, USC students and BlueCross BlueShield of South Carolina information technology professionals.

"This goal is vital to the future viability of our member companies," Consortium Executive Director **Lonnie Emard** said. "We need young students to experience firsthand what some of the future possibilities are and begin to know that having fun and earning a great salary can go hand in hand."

The Consortium for Enterprise Systems Management is a collaboration of companies, colleges and universities, and community groups that share a mission: Increase the number of people in the IT talent pipeline. It works from the classroom to the boardroom to increase the talent in the IT pipeline by teaching students about available opportunities and providing IT professionals with opportunities to develop their skills. SC TEAM CHOSEN FOR NATIONAL FORUM

A five-member team representing South Carolina attended the **American Youth Policy Forum** in Boston, Massachusetts. The event was hosted by **America's Promise Alliance** and the **National Governors Association Center for Best Practices**. The purpose of the forum was to continue South Carolina's effort in increasing the high school graduation and college readiness rates. The South Carolina team joined other policy makers and educators from Alabama, Delaware, and Kansas, as well as state leaders from Boston. Coordinating the travel for the SC team was the SC Department of Education, Office of Innovation.

Participating from South Carolina were **Dr. Sam Drew**, National Dropout Prevention Center; **Rep. Jerry Govan**, SC House of Representatives; **Dr. John Lane**, SC Department of Education; **Val Richardson**, Palmetto Health and Chair of the SC At-Risk Student Committee; and **Dr. Kaye Shaw**, Executive Director of Midlands Education and Business Alliance and Coordinator of Midlands Regional Education Center.

During the three-day session the state teams studied best practices centered around early identification of at-risk youth from Massachusetts educators including **Dr. Paul Reville**, Secretary of Education. The teams visited exemplary schools such as Gateway to College, an alternative high school on the campus of Wachusett Community College; Brockton High School, a 4400 pupil school that has had tremendous success in reaching all students through their literacy initiative; and Brockton's Pathways Center, a dropout recovery facility. ■

- ▶ Try not to be critical.
- ▶ Always remember there are no dumb questions.
- ▶ You will want to know the information your child wants to share.
- ▶ Talk to your child's friends; it will be most interesting.
- ▶ Once a day let your child know you value his or her opinion.
- ▶ Remember, no one listens when you yell. ■
